RABIES ALERT: A DEADLY BUT PREVENTABLE DISEASE

A recent case of tragic death of a man in **Cabuyao, Laguna** due to **rabies** — **nine months after he was bitten by a dog in Cavite**. The patient **did not complete the full course of anti-rabies vaccination**, which ultimately led to the fatal outcome.

This heartbreaking incident is a strong reminder of how **dangerous rabies can be** if not treated promptly and properly. CALABARZON — where many of our members live and work — remains one of the **regions with the highest incidence of rabies** in the country.

What is Rabies?

Rabies is a **deadly viral disease** that attacks the brain and nervous system. (Tagalog: *Rabies ay isang nakakamatay na sakit na sanhi ng virus na umaatake sa utak at sistema ng nerbiyos.*)

It is commonly spread through the **bite or scratch of an infected animal**, usually a dog or cat. Once symptoms appear, rabies is almost **always fatal**.

Who is at Risk?

- People bitten or scratched by animals — especially stray or unvaccinated dogs or cats.
- Those living in areas with poor access to anti-rabies vaccines.
- Children are particularly vulnerable because they often play with animals.

What Are the Symptoms of Rabies?

- Fever (Lagnat)
- Headache (Sakit ng ulo)
- Muscle weakness (Panghihina)
- Tingling or pain at the bite site
- Fear of water (*Hydrophobia*)
- Confusion, agitation, seizures

Note: Symptoms may appear days to months after the bite.

How to Prevent Rabies

After an animal bite or scratch

- Wash the wound immediately with soap and running water for at least 15 minutes. (*Hugasan agad ang sugat ng sabon at tubig sa loob ng 15 minuto.*)
- Go to the nearest **Animal Bite Center (ABC)** right away.
- **Do not wait for symptoms** to appear — once they do, it's often too late.
- Complete the required **anti-rabies vaccine** series as prescribed.

For Pet Owners

- Have pets vaccinated against rabies every year.
- Keep them indoors or on a leash when outside.
- Avoid keeping wild or stray animals.

Where to Get Vaccinated

You may go to the **nearest DOH-accredited Animal Bite Center (ABC)** or government health facility. These centers are usually available in:

- City or Municipal Health Offices
- District or Provincial Hospitals
- Public or Private Hospitals or clinics with ABC services
- Some health centers operated by LGUs (Local Government Units)
